- Hope to see the Towne center improved!
- The way you keep raising taxes, only upper income people will be able to afford to live here. I see us as the Lake Forest Park neighborhood of Shoreline.
- Interesting that the photo associated with the 'Vision Statement' is of a PRIVATE park (LFP Civic Club). THAT in itself should highlight one of the areas where "Lake" Forest Park is deficient broad access to the lake. Yes, there is a VERY SMALL access point - that could/should be expanded. AND somehow need to be more 'collaborative' with business. The many expensive planning meetings for Town Center (went nowhere after an expenditure of \$250,000 if I recall correctly) and now 'southern gateway' waste our precious resources. Be WELCOMING to merchants, not DICTATORIAL. Businessmen WANT to make money and be successful - HELP THEM achieve what they can afford - NOT TELL THEM what they SHOULD afford (re redevelopment). We DO need more of a business tax base in the community OR (sigh) consider a merger with Kenmore which has a nicely business/residential base.
- Although I may not be here twenty years from now, my son and his family have chosen to make their home in Lake Forest Park. I would like to see LFP to always be a safe place to live. I hope neighbors from block to block maintain and form a coalition that watches over each other. Also, streets are better lit with motion lights to make them safe. I hope LFP keeps their trees, wet lands and woody areas as part of its make up. I also hope to see the community keeps a good balance of homes and small apartment communities for those who can't afford to buy a home, but enjoy living surrounded by nature. I have lived in LFP for over 18 years, and I enjoyed immensely my surroundings. If the LFP government always involves the LFP citizens in the decision process, the result will be good sounding decisions that will benefit all.
- I really value the community and programming at the Third Place Commons and wonder if and how this can be supported.
- As an artist living in Lake Forest Park , I would like the city to have a more visually pleasant environment. The south entrance to the city at 145th is an embarrassment now with some very tall and inappropriate signage. Recommend: regulations on the size and height of signs. Highway 522 cuts the city in half. Recommend: a pedestrian overpass at the Mall to connect the two parts of Lake Forest Park and encourage more walking around the city.
- To minimize the amount of impermeable surface in the City and to provide for growth, I believe the City needs to look at amending the height restrictions for single and multi-family development - while respecting view issues.
- The view from the Towne Centre is underutilized. Could we have a viewing/eating common area that is both out & indoors, that takes advantage of this natural marvel? Also, thank you for your dedication and work. Im excited about this, and I know the community is too.:)
- I would like to see private public partnership that turns the various shopping centers into true cultural centers. This requires an overview that also incorporates all the adjoining cities in the North end of King County.

- I would love to see strong, active support for the Town Center and to help it maintain its role as our community center. We LOVE 3rd Place books and the food court area and were very sad to see the Cuban and pizza places disappear. I realize it is privately owned, but I hope the city is putting pressure on the owners to maintain and prioritize our community core. Otherwise, I'd love to see more sidewalks in LFP!
- Hi -- Among LFP's many virtues, one problem stands out for me, and for many bus commuters. We have great bus service along Bothell Way, but no place for city citizens to park their cars near bus stops. Given the hills, darkness nearly half the year (generally associated with big puddles) during commute hours, and lack of sidewalks and bike lanes, walking and biking to the bus stops is difficult and sometimes perilous. (And impossible for those of us who are disabled.) There have been numerous efforts over the past 20 years to find commuter parking to no avail. Perhaps the two most worthwhile efforts 1) tried to persuade the shopping center to allow commuter parking and 2) proposed by Mayor Goss that identified two streets close to bus stops that had plenty of room for commuter parking. Ironically, both failed despite 1) clear [U.S.] evidence that commuter parkers enhance sales at shopping centers and that commuter parkers make the streets they park on safer by increasing pedestrian (the drivers & their passengers) traffic. It's about time to make headway on this problem!
- Lake Forest Park could use an influx of both higher-end eateries for adults and family-friendly restaurants. Perhaps a pub, like McMenamins, where residents can gather regularly to build community and enjoy a meal/drink. I would also like to see more public gathering places, a greater commitment to public art, and city-sponsored holiday events for families, like tree lightings, trick-or-treating, and other periodic gatherings. Finally, in order to make the city safer for residents, particularly children, I would love to see sidewalks come to residential streets. As it is now, I am afraid to let my children walk to Horizon View Park and Lynwood Park for fear of being struck by vehicles, despite our proximity to each location.
- I can't make the Home Occupation Business Owner's meeting tonight, but wanted to pass along a few comments: 1) B&O Taxes: The LFP B&O Tax is unfair to home-based businesses. Most professionals (and small companies) have a home office and spend time working from home. However, the vast majority do not register with the City, get a Home Occupation permit, or pay B&O taxes. I suggest that B&O taxes only be required if there is a physical retail presence within the City (essentially the Towne Center), and exempt home based businesses/offices from having to pay these fees. These taxes are punitive and discourage people from working from home. 2) Access to broadband: Comcast is terrible, and there is no incentive for them to upgrade their connection speeds because there is no competition afforded by the City's franchise rules. If we are going to compete, we need to be thinking about how to get 1Gps service in our City with fiber to people's homes. Wireless connectivity/broadband is also important. We need better wireless service at people's home because this is often the sole communication device that we have (side note - we desperately need better wireless service at Brookside elementary school. It is a huge public safety issue that everyone's calls drop near the school and there is no service inside the school at all).
- We have recently become acquainted with the fact that LFP is developing a comprehensive plan for our community. We are excited there is a process for community participation. We plan to attend several of the remaining meetings to become more involved. To that end, we became aware of a meeting held tonight with home-based business owners in the community. We were not in attendance but understand, through a comment on the application NextDoor, that there is an interest in allowing residents to put up signs for their home businesses. There was not

detail on what is exactly meant by this, however, we both have strong feelings about any interests in business signs being posted in residential areas. If this is the nature of the interest expressed at tonight's meeting we would like to weigh in that we are ADAMANTLY against this idea. One of the things that attracted us to LFP was its mission to preserve the predominately natural setting we all enjoy, free of the kind of prolific advertising we see in other communities around us. Signage in our residential zones would dramatically, negatively affect the residential/community feel we enjoy in these natural surroundings. The area was not conceived as a mixed use development and has remained desirable over the last 100 years because there has been separation between residential and commercial use spaces. In fact, it was one of the most compelling aspects of its original development. we would hope there would be the opportunity to vet this thoroughly with the majority of residents before anything like this would ever be allowed.

- Summary of part of last night's 3MW home-based business meeting discussion about signage - It sounds like some of the home-based business owners would like to be able to put something up on their properties which communicates that a business is in operation on that site. Nothing too specific was discussed. Everyone seemed to get the idea that LFP residents don't want anything gaudy. There did seem to be at least some interest in at least one "City-approved" design. My take on it was that business owners just wanted some way to be able to communicate with people looking for the business and maybe some pass-by traffic (walking and vehicle). Maybe an example we can relate to is the the Gutter Glove, and sometimes tax help service, signs on 178th between 29th & 33rd. I, personally, don't consider these a match for our city. I could explain why, but mostly think it boils down to the signs providing a sense of permanency. I also don't think these are awfully horrible and won't complain because they are neighbors who have decided for themselves that these signs seem to be important. At any rate, that's my take on the discussion so far. I, personally, would be okay with small placards which could be attached to mailboxes, fences, entryways or something of the sort. I think the effort should be City-directed, but not cookie-cutter. I'd think having the City design a series of options from which business owners to choose might be the best way to be able to say yes and support/promote LFP businesses, but not have the option get out of control. I'd think size would be important. I can't imagine signs would need to be more than 11"x17" (and in my opinion that might be too big). I'd like to see something crafted out of metals like (brushed) bronze (don't know if cost of this might be prohibitive???).
- We are relatively new homeowners in the area and are interested in what efforts are taking place relative to historic preservation in our area. This history of this area and the people who originally created the community we now enjoy are a significant part of what we found desirable when choosing to purchase here. With the state's GMA as a driver and LFP's work on an update to the community's Comprehensive Plan we are wondering what role historic preservation will play in this planning. We live at 2847 NE 178th Street (previously and charmingly known as Serpentine Way). Our home was built in 1915 by W.B. Keith, a widowed carpenter with one son, (according to county records) and featured in The Seattle Daily Times ad for the area in the May 9, 1916. AND-we've saved the best point till the last - YOU CAN

RIDE TO TOWN IN COMFORTABLE AUTO STAGES OVE A FINE PAVED BOULEVARD IN EXACTLY HALF AN HOUR." :-) As we gut the house and work to structurally and aesthetically restore it we are keeping an eye on the character of the original structure. We are also keeping the vision for the area in mind in terms of environment as it relates to our watershed and habitats. As we do this we are wondering if there is an organized effort to access information and/or resources to guide this. Further, is there an effort in place to recognize or designate historical structures? If there are conversations that we can participate in, information that can help us or other ways for us to engage with this topic please let us know.

- I would like to see these improvements: Sidewalks on side streets, speed bumps or planted circles to slow down speeding traffic, maintain neighborhood traffic lanes with paint or buttons, quality family restaurants, senior housing, clean up the creek.
- I hope that LFP will remain very green- maintain any ordinances that protect trees in the city. I would like to see continued good stewardship and growth of parks and shared green spaces, specifically along the water. I hope that Lake Forest Park will be a city that is strong on equity and social justice for all people regardless of race, ethnicity, age, ability, sexual orientation, gender, religion, etc. Thank you!
- Notes on specific sections of the Vision Statement: 1) I am concerned by the phrase "managing growth" in this paragraph. There are a lot of positive impacts to density, and the city should be leery of legislating a specific idea of what types of homes define Lake Forest Park. Other, more specific notes: Lake Forest Park should work to ensure that there is bus service from anywhere in the city to get to the Town Center and the future Lynnwood Link stations at Mountlake Terrace Transit Station or 185th Street. For those of us living northeast of Ballinger Way, there is only one bus route that serves us, and it is a commuter bus that runs only in the mornings and evenings. A circulator or something of that sort to serve Brier/Lake Forest Park/Shoreline could be a major benefit for the accessibility of the region to high capacity transit. This could be addressed by modifying paragraph 7 of the vision statement to include access to larger hubs outside of the city.
- I'm considering moving out of the LFP area because I feel that some of the things I most value about the city are eroding. Lots are being clear cut so that multiple houses can be squeezed in. Trees are being removed at an alarming rate. 40th Place NE is scheduled for an overlay even though the road is fine. Why encourage more through-traffic speeding when we could spend that money burying some of the utility lines? We spend too much on downed line restoration and repair. We spend money for unskilled hacks to butcher our trees on every street, but we won't invest in burying power lines. My neighbors and I have complained for 13 years about a neighbors yard that has weeds over 4 feet high, multiple dead cars and dead boats with plants growing out of them, and a rat infestation. The invasive plants that have overtaken his large lot

continue to seed on our lots. His dump of a property is an embarrassment and depreciates our property. In 13 years we've seen no improvement and are told all you can do is ask him to clean it up. He doesn't, and there are no repercussions. Even the depressed area of Burien near the airport has stricter codes than we do. Down the street we have to pass a house that has 6+ junky vehicles in their yard, as well as commercial trucks and tractors parked on the street and in their driveway. What used to be a quiet and woodsy neighborhood is not less woodsy and - on some days - blasted by commercial jets flying low overhead every few minutes. I had no foreknowledge that this was going to happen, so I was appalled when I was suddenly living under an airport flight path. Every year we repair the potholes on our street because - with 2 exceptions - we can't get LFP to repair them for us. We have already spent too much money on consultants to help us develop a vision for LFP. We spent a small fortune several years ago on how to change the Towne Centre and nothing came of it other than disappointment and money lost that could have been put to better use. My ideas for the future of LFP are: Write a code that does not allow dead vehicles, boats, commercial vehicles, RVs, etc. in site of neighbors, that allows for not keeping a well maintained lot, but does not allow people to have dead vehicles or boats, or commercial equipment in sight. Concentrate development in the area of LFP that is commercial and not in the wooded areas. Don't allow subdivision of lots into hideous tract homes or McMansions. Work to get the flight path diverted so that it is not flying low over the highest hills in the city. Stop hiring gorillas to randomly hack down trees and start burying sections of the power lines. I'd happily pay more not to see them and to protect our trees. Move money for expensive, unnecessary consultants and unnecessary asphalt overlays and start enforcing code. Give a little more attention to the side streets that are crumbling.

- I would like to see LFP maintain the aspects that make LFP unique, mainly its park-like setting, amazing groves of trees, windy roads that follow creeks and old Indian trails, quiet pedestrian-friendly streets and neighborhoods. It is my opinion that the trees and natural environment that surrounds our homes is what sets us apart from all other neighborhoods, even among Seattle suburbs. That is the one thing that visitors always mention - the beauty and calmness of living in a forest. If anything takes away from that then we lose it all and become just another suburb, nothing special, nothing unique, nothing attractive. Whatever decisions are made for the inevitable changes for us in the next decade we must always keep this in mind at the top of the list and make this the highest priority and requirement.
- One of my clients years ago was a famous truck manufacture. I held the license for their trademark uses and as such, called on their dealer base in North America. A common complaint from the dealer principles was over how rigid the manufacture was over producing the highest price truck in the market place, ignoring the sales opportunities with less expensive products. "Why does every single piece of equipment have to be the very best?" they would ask. "Why can't we specify some cheaper parts to help drive the price down?" they would lament. The factory planners knew, of course, that left to do their bidding, the dealers would chisel away pieces of the quality until the quality that built the very existence of the truck would be drained away. The market would be lost by those who wish to cheapen it. This example is much the same with our City of LFP. Smart planners know well enough to leave things alone when they are already the best. LFP had the best planner with Mother Nature when she gifted us with creeks, hills and trees to live within. I believe our future is now and to change it can only diminish its value. The City is like a wetlands, you don't drain it, you preserve it.
- Hello, I have been a 20+ year resident of LFP, living off of 182nd, Sheridan Heights and now on 25th. I love it here with the exception of safe walkways on main streets. I think this is a HUGE

concern and will eventually diminish our livability. I would like to see either semi-protected walkways or sidewalks on 178th or Perkins. This lack of safe walk ways needs to be remedied in any comprehensive plan. Thank you.

- We need sidewalks for a more pedestrian friendly city! One takes their own life in their hands by attempting to walk from home to - anywhere. I hate being dependent on my car to get out.

- Great place to live, no place to shop. Please, more bike trails and sidewalks.
- As a thirty-something I have many friends who fight tooth and nail to live in areas like Wallingford, Fremont, Ravenna, etc. We are the NEW PRIME location for an inviting family city that is up to date, "hip," accessible, etc. but with a ton of character. My friends refer to LFP as a retirement community. The Town Center is mostly to blame (less the honey bear and Third Place Books!)
- Here are my comments: 1) Trader Joes. 2) Get rid of Albertson. 3) Develop the Town Center – Need anchor that will attract. 4) Allow mother in law apartment without special zoning – big houses have room to board people. 5) Enough space (8,000 sq ft) ADU – use the land. 6) Sidewalks/bikelanes to get to Burke Gilman. Need safe access to the trail.
- Here are my comments: 1) Love the Burke Gilman Trail. 2) Synchronize lights from Bothell to Seattle. May help traffic flow. 3) Concern about 144th new development congestion. 4) Improve intersection at 145th – should have two right hand turns.
- Lake Forest park is a gorgeous place, but it needs more sidewalks.
- Please remove the dogs at the outdoor market. Some snap at children.
- Here are my comments: 1) Develop the Town Center with condos to increase the tax base. 2) City codes to prohibit junk cars in yards. 3) Get rid of crows.
- Put a booth/table at the Commons for people to suggest ideas. You will get a different crowd.
- Don't want sidewalks. There are walkways up by Horizon Park. It's nice to feel like you are more rural. Sidewalks will just increase traffic.
- Satisfied with how the City is right now. I live up by Horizon Park. It feels safe.
- Improve the flow of exiting from the back-upped lot of City Hall. The light backs up. Improve the exit by Windermere.
- Good group (homeowners meeting). Intelligent and civil. Turning the psychology on its head – 180 degrees should be the objective. Foster and encourage clean businesses and their prosperity is a legitimate government objective. Regulate only as necessary to prevent nuisances such as excessive traffic, noise, odor, etc. Become known as a magnet for energized, creative folks.
- My neighbor could not come but wanted me to give her input. She would like to see a local business directory.
- Allow signs (for home businesses) that are discreet and tasteful. Maintain a directory of licensed LFP businesses. Meaningful economic development would support small, home-based

businesses already existing and encourage new, small development. We need better sign policy and networking so that local business is community supported, and also supports the community. Small business should organically respond to community needs. We should feel supported, not thwarted by city policy.

- Here are my comments: 1) make a commitment to reduce barriers to home-based businesses. 2) Study ways to reduce existing barriers and encourage and support home-based businesses. 3) Allow small, tasteful signage at businesses. 4) Help citizens identify local businesses that conserve and encourage local use. 5) Bring us a list of things being done in other communities to encourage and support home-based businesses.
- The 'Big Ideas' have to be defined by what our goal of LFP is to "look" like in 20 years from now. I would hope that we could make our town sustainable in terms of having businesses here that serve the needs of our community. We support our businesses – they support us. I really hope that the town Center will reflect and work with our community in the direction of sustainability as I talked about on the front (of the comment card). Actually I wish the City would work towards buying the Town Center. Maybe not today – but in the future.
- Rethinking the Town Center to bring in more housing and commercial space would address several of my "most important" ideas, the issue would be to keep it in line with community character.
- Thank you for considering an increased capacity for health and human services for the elderly and infirm. Note: please understand also the need for pro-active, currently informed people to advocate for the people in need, the paperwork process can be convoluted and confusing and sometimes discouraging to those whom need our help. Thank you.
- Here are my comments: 1) I support a very strong human services element. 2) I support maintenance and strengthening of environmental standards and ordinances. 3) I support retaining the large 20K lots in LFP.
- Here are my comments: 1) Public access to the water – open up ROW's that access the lake. 2) Add commercial/housing zoning from 35th Ave to Shoreline. 3) Make Perkins Way NE one way.
- Maintain traditional LFP environment. Slow down development.
- NE 178th is getting a bike lane this spring/summer. Can the uphill bike lane be extended so that it becomes the uphill west connector between the Burke Gilman and the Interurban Trail. The Eastbound can remain Perkins. 178th has better sign lines going uphill.
- Preserving our community and character are paramount. Traffic, light rail, more traffic are huge challenges and opportunities for our community. There are lots of smart, energetic people and we can/will succeed.

- I think that it would be nice to have a public transportation system (improved busses or an elevated trail system, like the Link train.) It makes transportation in growing population easier and less hectic. Also a community center such as YMCA would be pretty nice.
- Protecting the wildlife would be one of my main concerns in LFP. Although we have a fairly neat and clean environment, we may want to reduce the building of companies/any construction in order to sustain the quality of our environment. Community gatherings may also bring more unity to our city. These can be as simple as music festivals and even sharings of talent from individuals.
